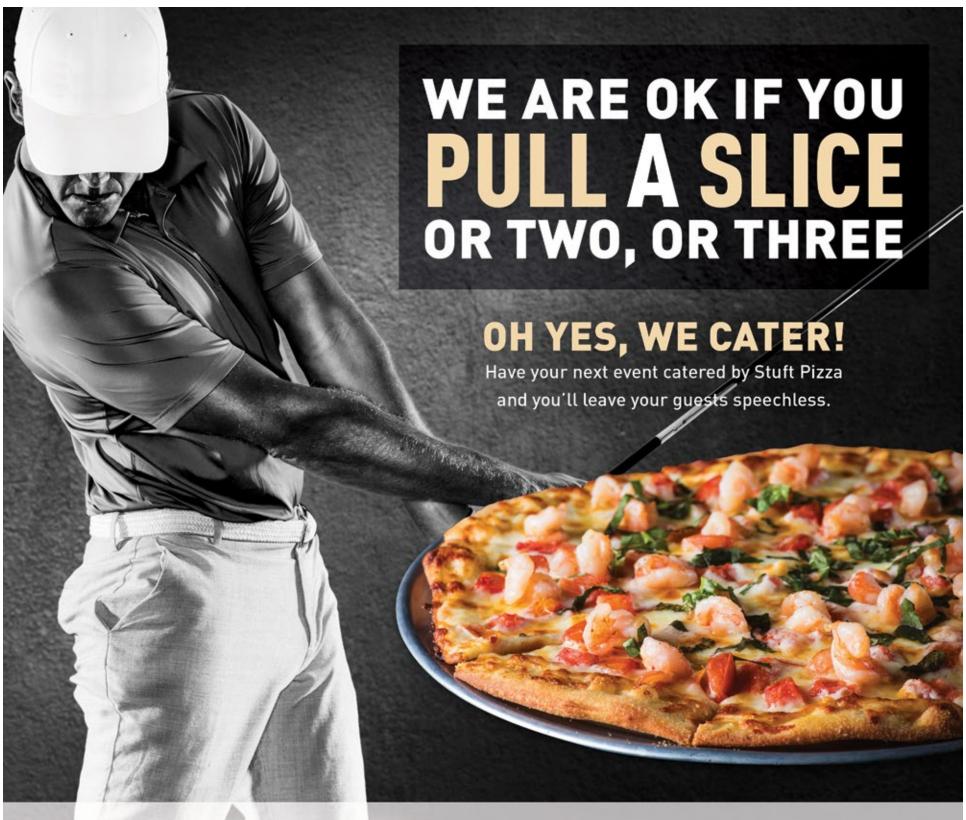

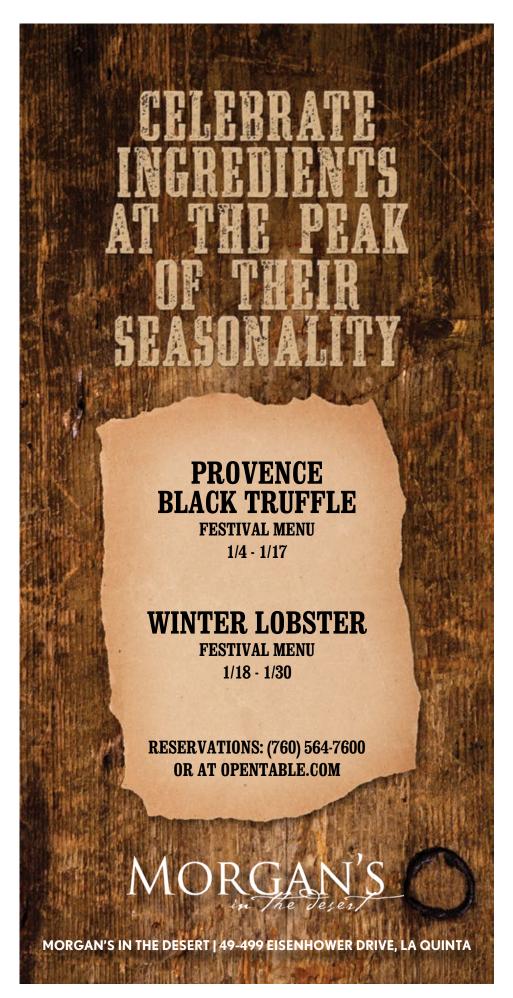

## **Coming Soon:** The Greater Coachella Valley **Chamber of Commerce**

You may have heard, and now it's official. The La Quinta Chamber of Commerce is partnering with the Indio Chamber of Commerce to become the Greater Coachella Valley Chamber of Commerce. Coachella Chamber of Commerce is considering joining as well.







Discussed informally for years, months in the works, with formal presentations to the three boards within the last few weeks, La Quinta and Indio chambers have voted to merge. Coachella votes soon. 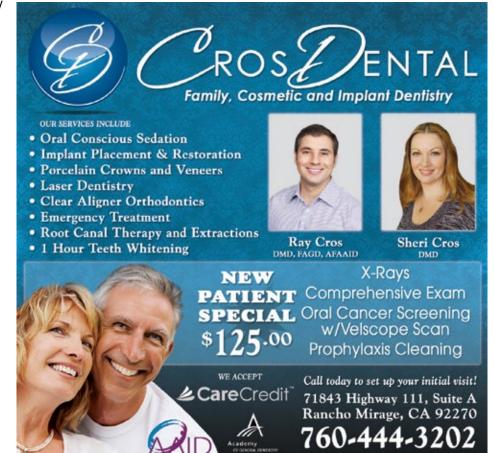

### **PUBLIC WORKS AT WORK**

### "It's All About Safety"

Traffic signal maintenance staff works year-round to ensure safety on City roads. They're proactive and diligent in their efforts to upgrade signals and improve intersections so traffic flows smoothly and drivers and pedestrians are safe. Below are some of the recent successes the City is proud to share:

### The Brighter, the Better

The City recently made some key upgrades at the Washington Street and Highway 111 intersection in an effort to reduce accidents. Since the majority of accidents were taking place at night, staff upgraded the lighting system using light-emitting diode (LED) lighting, which puts out more light and uses less power. It's now more brightly lit for nighttime drivers. Additionally, drivers were not yielding to pedestrians who were using the southerly crosswalk from the Beer Hunter to LG's Prime Steakhouse. The City installed "NO RIGHT TURN ON RED" signs that illuminate during the "WALK" phase, protecting pedestrians when they are invited to cross Washington Street.

#### Mind Those Red Lights

Unintentionally running red lights can result in tragic accidents. The City is doing its best to enhance traffic light visibility by installing additional traffic signal heads on wider roads. This will help make red

lights even more visible to drivers as they approach major intersections. For example, the visibility at the intersections of Fred Waring Drive/Adams Street and Washington Street/Simon Drive has now been improved by the addition of signal heads.

### Going Wireless - Good Idea!

Antennas have been installed at major intersections to facilitate wireless, real-time communication with City Hall. Major benefits include:

- ✓ Faster speed the signals now communicate with the City's central computer system much faster than the old telephone lines. This saves time and money.
- ✓ **Better visual** staff is able to display all systems that control signals on large-sized television monitors in the Traffic Operations Center at City Hall, allowing staff to address problems remotely from City Hall, which also saves time and money.
- Greater capacity the system will soon provide live video, allowing staff to monitor traffic flow and make timing changes any time of day. This is critical during special events and construction.

### FIRE DEPARTMENT

### **Put a Freeze on Winter Fires**

Home fires occur more in winter than in any other season. As you stay cozy and warm this winter season, be fire smart!

Half of all home heating fires occur in the months of December, January, and February.

Here are some helpful tips to stay safe:

- Keep portable generators outside, away from windows, and as far away as possible from your house
- Install and test carbon monoxide alarms at least once a month
- Have a qualified professional clean and inspect your chimney and vents every year
- Store cooled ashes in a tightly covered metal container and dispose of only when cold
- Plug only one heat-producing appliance into an electrical outlet at a time
- Keep anything that can burn at least three feet from any heat source like fireplaces, wood stoves, radiators, or space heaters

Please keep in mind that heating equipment is involved in one of every six reported home fires and one in every five home fire deaths.

## La Quinta Village Businesses Request Parking Time Limits

Businesses in the La Quinta Village are reaching out to the City for help with parking time limits for public parking spaces on Avenida La Fonda, Calle Estado, and Desert Club Drive. They're hoping parking signs with time restrictions can be installed as a convenience to their customers and, ultimately, as something good for all businesses in The Village. Based on initial discussions with business owners, City staff is recommending three hour parking restrictions

for all public parking spaces on Calle Estado, Avenida La Fonda, and Desert Club Drive between the hours of 8 a.m. to 7 p.m., seven days a week, which may be implemented as early as March. There are no parking restrictions recommended for the City-owned parking lot at the northwest corner of Avenida Montezuma and Avenida Bermudas and no private parking would be affected such as in Old Town or the two parking lots just west of Old Town at Calle Tampico and Desert Club Drive. The recommendation will be presented to the City Council at an upcoming date to be announced. ### POLICE DEPARTMENT

### **Citizen Volunteer Program**

The La Quinta Police Department (LQPD) is committed to community-oriented policing. The LQPD Volunteer Program was created with this philosophy in mind and its goal is to:



- Recruit volunteers from the community;
- Train volunteers in various police-related duties, which are routinely performed by paid police personnel; and
- Allow volunteers to function in direct support of the police department.

The main principles of community-oriented policing are to educate the community and build trust. The establishment of a citizen volunteer program enables law enforcement and the community to share ownership, decision making and accountability.

The LQPD Volunteer Program's members are people from the community who are willing to dedicate their time and effort toward keeping La Quinta an area where residents and visitors enjoy quality living. Typical duties of the citizen volunteers include:

- Citizens on Patrol
- Traffic Control
- Clerical and Data Entry
- Event Crowd Control
- Staffing the Community Policing Office
- Interacting With and Assisting the Public
- Home and Business Security Checks

# To Encourage Water Conservation, Drought Penalties Have Been Increased

The good news is that about 76% of Coachella Valley Water District (CVWD) customers are meeting the drought budgets. Unfortunately, this isn't enough. The state requires CVWD customers to reduce overall water use by 36% (when compared to the same month in 2013) or CVWD could face penalties of up to \$10,000 per day. To further encourage conservation, CVWD now prohibits outdoor irrigation on Mondays and Thursdays from now through March 31. There are also increased drought penalties, which go into effect with December water use for bills mailed in January:

Water use in Tier 1 No Penalty
Water use in Tier 2, up to 64% No Penalty
Water use in Tier 2, above 64% Regular rate + \$2.51/unit

Water use in Tier 3

Water use in Tier 3

Regular rate + \$5/unit

Regular rate + \$10/unit

Water use in Tier 5

Regular rate + \$20/unit

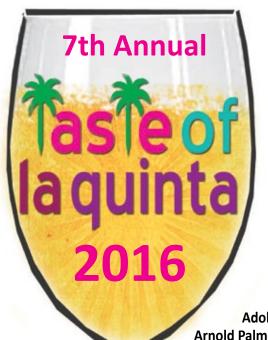

# The Negative Impact of Retaining Income in a Trust

As a result of the Affordable Care Act, almost all trusts with net taxable income in excess of \$12,300 are realizing an additional 3.8% Net Investment Income Tax (NII Tax) on Net Investment Income (NII) retained by the trust. Common types of Income subject to the NII Tax include capital gain, interest and dividend income. In addition, trust income in excess of \$12,300 is subject to income tax at a staggering rate of 39.6%. The consequences of retaining income in a trust rather than distributing the income to beneficiaries could be costing you thousands in unnecessary tax liabilities.

A trust which requires all income to be distributed annually, known as a Simple Trust, is not generally subject to the NII Tax on interest and dividend income since such income is deemed to be distributed to the beneficiaries, whether or not actual distributions are made. In contrast, capital gain is generally required to be retained by the trust and would be subject to the NII Tax.



A trust that is not a Simple Trust, known as a Complex Trust, may or may not require that income is to be distributed annually. Such a trust would be exempt from the NII Tax only to the extent of income required to be distributed annually, if any, and distributions that are actually made to the beneficiaries. Planning for discretionary distributions therefore is absolutely essential if you want to minimize the NII Tax and increase your return on investment.

It is important to remember that the 39.6 tax bracket for a trust begins at the very low threshold of \$12,300.

A married beneficiary by contrast would not reach the 39.6 tax bracket until their taxable income exceeds \$464,850, and would not be subject to the NII Tax unless their modified adjusted gross income exceeds \$250,000. If no distributions have been made by December 31, 2015, an option is still available to designate distributions made during the first 65 days of 2016 as if they were made in 2015.

Please note that a careful analysis of the trust agreement is necessary to ensure the trustee has the ability to make discretionary distributions to shift income from the trust to the beneficiaries.

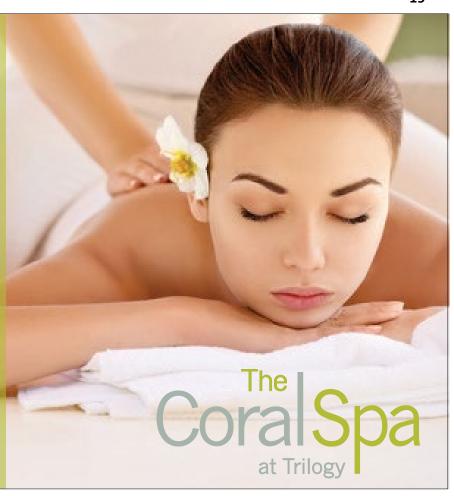

# You Owe, You Owe, So Off to the IRS You Go

The old adage, "if you ever find yourself in a hole, stop digging," is never truer when it comes to owing taxes.

This tax season, several taxpayers will wait until the very last minute to file their tax returns. Why? It's not because of any far-reaching audit conspiracy. It's because these taxpayers owe money on top of previous taxes owed in prior years. Call it stacking; call it pyramiding. In any form, taxpayers must stop digging.

Taxpayers have some options if they are unable to pay their assessed tax liability. The best option is to full pay the taxes when they are due. United States citizens live in a pay-as-you-go tax society, which means that taxes must be paid as income is earned. Taxpayers do this either through withholdings or by making estimated tax payments.

If taxpayers cannot full pay their taxes when due, several tax agencies will allow for payment plans. For example. the Internal Revenue Service will give taxpayers a no-questions-asked 120 days to full pay their liability. The IRS will also enter into an installment agreement with taxpayers; the length, term and conditions dependent upon the amount of taxes owed and prior tax history of the taxpayer. Keep in mind, however, there is an application fee associated with setting up an installment agreement.

Unfortunately, an installment agreement is similar to house arrest. The IRS must receive the payment no later than 10 days after the due date; otherwise the installment agreement is cancelled and the entire balance becomes due. Also, the IRS will not allow taxpayers to continue to owe year after year; taxpayers must full pay their taxes by the due date of the return.

Taxpayers who do owe prior years and are in danger of owing again should they file their tax return right away. After 2-3 weeks, taxpayers can call the IRS and request an installment agreement for all prior years plus the current year.

Taxpayers do not need a tax professional to setup a 120-day hold or an installment agreement; these options are relatively simple to establish. Unfortunately, several taxpayers are unable or unwilling to continue with the terms of the installment agreement. Most taxpayers believe they can negotiate better terms with the IRS or ignore the next IRS letter after the missed due date. Nothing can be further from the truth. This is the time to hire a professional.

The longer taxpayers wait to resolve a collection issue, the harder it will be to resolve the liability painlessly.

### There is No Substitute for a Good Substitute

The quality education that is provided to the students of Desert Sands Unified School District (DSUSD) is dependent on approximately 1,400 highly qualified teachers who are in the classroom each and every day. Our teaching family extends beyond those in a permanent position on the DSUSD team to our guest teachers who cover

our classrooms when a teacher is out for

professional development training or for personal reasons such as illness or family crisis. On any given day there are approximately 100-120 substitutes needed at DSUSD.

Recent articles in both the education-focused press and mainstream media have noted the shortage of teachers in school districts around the country. They have not always included the fact that there is also a shortage of qualified substitute, or guest, teachers. Desert Sands Unified School District, as well as the other two school districts in the Coachella Valley, maintains lists of pre-qualified and trained substitute teachers – and that pool is shrinking.

DSUSD, like other districts, is looking for innovative solutions to the situation. Desert Sands Unified School District seeks professionals with college degrees in all industries to consider guest teaching. Desert residents in professions requiring top level skills in math, science, language arts, foreign languages, and other academic subjects are encouraged to speak to the district regarding serving as CBEST "waivered" teachers. The CBEST is the California Basic Educational Test that gauges the competency levels of a teacher in math and language arts.

Qualified professionals interested in serving as guest teachers, but who have not taken the CBEST, may apply for a CBEST waiver that is good for one year. Of the 62 teachers recently added to the approved substitute teacher list, 30 of them are "waiver teachers." The new substitute teachers recently took part in a full day of training that included instructional strategies aligned with the Common Core Standards, behavior management, and student engagement strategies. Information included how to best support students with special needs. The sessions also included how to respond to safety and security incidents.

A recent increase to the substitute daily pay rate has also assisted in the recruitment of qualified guest teachers. In October, the DSUSD Board of Education approved payment of \$135 as a daily rate for substitute teachers and \$155 for those serving as long-term guest teachers. CBEST waivered teachers receive \$115 as the daily rate and \$135 when serving in an extended substitute role.

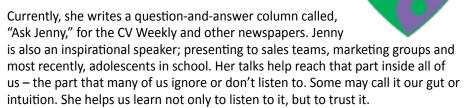

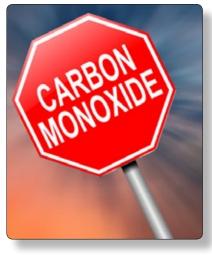

The symptoms of low level exposure are headache, general feelings of fatigue, shortness of breath, nausea and dizziness. High levels may cause, confusion, vomiting, loss of consciousness and, ultimately, death. If you are experiencing any of these symptoms, seek immediate medical attention.

- Never using a gas range or oven as a heat source
- Install carbon monoxide detectors outside all sleeping areas

# Using the "Bounce" of Your Sand Wedge

Without trying to make it sound too simple, it is important to understand that there are really two completely different situations that will determine the best way to get out of a bunker and onto the green. Last month, I described the technique you should use when the sand is less than perfect.

Remember, if the sand is wet or hard or if there seems to be little sand under your golf ball, you want your club head to dig into the sand. To do this, you want the leading edge of your wedge to enter the sand before the "bounce." To do this, you must have your clubface a lot less "open" than you normally would for a wedge shot. You will not get much loft or backspin, but at least you will have a chance of getting out of the bunker. This might be a good time to consider using your lob wedge or approach wedge as they both would have less of a "bounce" on their club head than your sand wedge.

When the sand is dry and "fluffy," your focus should be on having the "bounce" on the bottom of your sand wedge enter the sand before the leading edge. Now you can address the golf ball with a very "open" clubface like you see on TV. As you are starting out with an "open" clubface and are trying to strike the sand behind the golf ball with the "bounce" of the wedge, your clubface will stay in an "open" position through the swing and your clubface will be facing the sky on your finish.

Rickey Fowler describes his technique, when hitting from normal sand, as "slapping" the sand behind the golf ball with his right hand – allowing the club head to "skim" through the sand on a shallow path. This method

of using the "open" clubface and the "bounce" on the back of the wedge will result in a much higher golf shot with more backspin.

Before even trying to use this method, I would suggest trying it off the grass to see if you can feel the "slap" with your right hand as your clubface stays "open" well into your finish. You might even discover a better way to get over those bunkers before you have to worry about how to get out of them.

# Online Mentoring: A Flexible Way to Help Small Businesses Succeed

Many of you are familiar with Coachella Valley SCORE (sponsored by the Small Business Administration) for the mentoring it provides to business owners and the workshops that it conducts on topics such as sales and marketing, how to read financial statements, and social media. But you may not know that for over ten years, several Coachella Valley SCORE volunteers have been providing online counseling and mentoring to entrepreneurs and budding entrepreneurs from every part of the country.



Online mentoring facilitates finding a SCORE mentor who matches your needs and provides an opportunity for mentors to have more flexibility in advising clients. Before contacting a mentor, the prospective client searches a national data base of several hundred SCORE volunteers in order to find the volunteer

with the right experience for their needs. Once a suitable mentor is found, the client contacts the mentor via the national SCORE web site.

The SCORE online volunteers set their own schedule of availability. Many choose to be available seven days a week; others choose two or three days per week. Taking advantage of the Internet, the Coachella Valley SCORE volunteers can utilize their business experience to help people from all walks of life in many parts of the country.

Here are some typical inquiries received by Coachella Valley SCORE mentors (names changed to maintain confidentiality):

From Ohio, Anna H. wrote: "I have developed a business plan and need help moving through the steps from idea to reality."

From Utah, Dick C. asked: "How do we scale our hotel management operation in order for us to continue to keep buying more hotels?"

From Northern California, Charles H. inquired: "I have an idea and I have done a lot of initial research, but I need help determining potential volume, operating costs, and whether or not the business could be profitable."

When Norma L. of Nevada first contacted her SCORE counselor over the Internet, she was working two full-time jobs while trying to establish an online-based marketing consultancy business. After several months of mentoring, Norma was able to acquire a number of clients for her new business and leave both of her full-time jobs. Today she happily lives overseas in the country of her dreams while still growing her business and maintaining contact with her SCORE mentor.
