Make Way for the **Next Generations**

No definitive name has yet been given to the generation born after what has been termed the Millennial Generation. The Millennials are those born between 1982 and 2001, and the last of them will be graduating from our high schools in the next few years. They were born of Baby Boomer parents and were the most numerous, affluent, and ethnically diverse generation in

United States history. They produced the largest college enrollments and comprised a major buying group. Terms used to describe them included optimistic, team players, civic-minded, and family-oriented. Their parents instilled self-esteem and they say that they are ready to overcome challenges and be successful.

But what about the latest generation of school children - those born after 2001? They are the students in our elementary and middle schools – and even in the early years of high school. What describes them and what can we expect as they return to their classrooms later this month? While a name has yet to be attached to them, there are already characteristics that seem to fit them as a group. According to research by the marketing firm Frank N. Magid Associates, they are the most diverse of any generation in the United States and "are more likely than older generations to have social circles that include people from different ethnic groups, races, and religions." According to Magid, "Plurals (as he dubs them) are the least likely to believe that there is such a thing as the American Dream."

Scott Hess, vice president of insight at Teenage Research Unlimited (TRU), has another name for them. He calls them Post Gen for two reasons. They are the generation who "post" everything. If it happens, it goes onto social

media. They are also the generation that "is arriving on the scene immediately following a number of culturally seismic events: Post recession, Post Obama election, Post tsunami, Post 9/11, Post Millennial." He says that "it will be defined more by what came before than what comes after."

At this point, no one is certain if any of the above will directly impact our students or the way that they are taught. We already know that they are more tech savvy than any group before them. But, in some ways, because of that, they are loners, operating in a world where they communicate without physically seeing the people they are interacting with. It will be up to the educators working with these young people to use their unique history to create effective lesson plans as they prepare them to lead the world.

8 Foods to Avoid Feeding Fido this Thanksgiving

Let's face it: Dogs are members

of our family, and we want them to be part of our holiday celebrations. It's tempting to give your dog a little plate of Thanksgiving goodies, but there are some "human" foods that can be surprisingly dangerous for your dog. If your dog eats any of these foods, please consult your veterinarian immediately:

"LEAVE IT!"

- **1. Turkey** No, turkey is not poisonous for your dog. However, what is potentially dangerous is the high fat content in turkey skin, which should be avoided, and cooked bone, which can sliver in your dog's throat or stomach.
- **2. Macadamia Nuts** Though not deadly for dogs, ingesting macadamia nuts can cause muscle weakness, mild pain, tremors, and a high fever. These symptoms usually last for less than 48 hours.
- **3. Bread Dough** The live yeast in raw bread dough can expand in a dog's stomach and decrease blood flow and cause breathing difficulty. Affected dogs have bloated stomachs and may appear disoriented, and will vomit or dryheave. Dogs can experience seizures and/or go into a coma.
- **4. Alcohol** Even a small amount of any kind of alcohol consumed by dogs can cause disorientation and vomiting, and in severe cases, may lead to coma, seizures, and death. Beer is especially poisonous for dogs because of cultivated hops involved in the brewing process.
- **5. Sugar Free Gum and Baking Products** Xylitol is the sweetener often used in these products, and it can be lethal for dogs. Unlike humans, xylitol causes a drastic drop in blood sugar levels, leading to seizures and possible liver failure within a half-hour of ingestion.
- **6. Onions, Garlic, and Shallots** These foods have been known to damage red blood cells in dogs. The general rule is the stronger the taste, the more toxic it is for dogs. Affected dogs tire easily and their urine may be orange-tinged or red in color.
- **7. Grapes or Raisins** These foods can cause kidney failure in dogs. Lethargy, diarrhea, and vomiting often occur within 12 hours of ingestion, followed by decreased urination.
- **8. Chocolate** This includes brownies, cookies, or any baked goods containing cocoa. Dark chocolate is most dangerous for your pet, and may cause irregular heartbeat, vomiting, seizures, and even death.

Avoiding these foods will help to ensure a "pawsitively" wonderful holiday for your entire family!

CITY MANAGER'S MESSAGE



When the Grass ISN'T Always Greener on the Other Side

The City of La Quinta has taken the state-mandated water

reduction seriously and has made great strides to reduce turf, introduce xeriscaping in medians and around City

facilities, and reassess standard watering practices for sports fields and parks. In fact, we started our water reduction practices a few years ago and, like many of our residents, we are now struggling a bit to reach the goal of cutting back water consumption by 36 percent more than we already have. Currently, the City will be converting turf to desert scape in some areas in order to maintain our grassy parks and sports fields (within the water use reduction mandates); however, they will be looking...a bit less lush than in years past.

Part of living in the desert is dealing with extreme temperatures and little rainfall. Even with El Niño and the predictions that it may be one of the strongest we've seen bringing "extreme rainfall" from fall to spring, the National Weather Service is quick to say that it still won't be enough to rid us of the drought we are experiencing. Remember to conserve wherever you can and when replacing home appliances, swap to the new low-water varieties: low-flow toilets, high-efficiency washers, and low-flow showerheads. In the meantime, reducing shower time to five minutes, washing only full loads of laundry, and reducing toilet flushes by 25 percent will help conserve our precious resource. Every drop counts. For more water conservation methods you can adopt at home, visit the Coachella Valley Water District's website at cvwd.org.

PUBLIC WORKS AT WORK

The Public Works Department is busy working on a variety of projects. Some of our recent projects and efforts are centered on water, especially when it comes to El Niño preparedness and water savings.

Are You Prepared for El Niño?

The upcoming winter storms are expected to be heavier than normal due to the effects of El Niño, which is a phenomenon stemming from unusually warm water along the western coast of South America. It disrupts weather patterns and can cause a lot of rain in areas that are usually dry.

The City is being proactive in its efforts to keep residents safe and systems working as efficiently as possible. City crews are clearing storm drains and retention basins to provide maximum flood protection to public roadways and facilities. They're also sweeping streets to minimize the debris going into storm drains. As you prepare, please keep some important things in mind...

FIRE DEPARTMENT

November brings the beginning of the holiday season. Family and friends gather together to celebrate and enjoy festivities, which usually involves a meal. People tend to gather in or near the kitchen to enjoy each other's company. Did you know that careless cooking is the number one cause of residential fires? Follow these helpful tips below to help keep yourself and others safe:

Cooking Fire Safety:

- Keep children a safe distance from hot liquids and cooking surfaces. Establish a kid-free zone of at least three feet around the stove and areas where hot food or drink is prepared or carried.
- Always use potholders to prevent burn or scald injuries when handling hot surfaces, or items.
- Hot grease causes severe burns. Avoid using deep fat fryers around children.
- Clean the exhaust hood and duct over the stove regularly and wipe up spilled grease as soon as the surface of the stove is cool.
- It's wise to have a fire extinguisher near the kitchen. Keep it ten feet away from the stove on the exit side of the kitchen.
- Never pour water on a grease fire; turn off the stove and cover the pan with a lid, or close the oven door.
- Keep pot handles on the stove pointing to
 - the back and always watch young children in the kitchen.
- Don't store items on the stovetop because they could catch fire.
- Keep kitchen appliances clean and in good condition.
- Follow instructions carefully when using microwave ovens.
- Be sure your stove is not located under a window where curtains are hanging.
- If your clothing should catch fire, immediately stop, drop and roll to smother flames.
- Never leave anything cooking unattended.

Animal licensing fees will remain the same (see schedule below) but now the County's Department of Animal Services will mail out renewal notices prior to license expiration dates.

When Dogs Bite

This may or may not surprise you, but Max, Bella and all their canine friends cause more than one-third of all homeowner insurance claims. This adds approximately \$530 million a year to insurance costs.

The number of claims have decreased. However, the cost of the average claim from dog bites and other injuries from our furry friends is on the rise. This is according to the Insurance Information Institute,

The Institute found that dog bite claims nationwide decreased 4.7 percent in 2014, however the average cost per dog bite claim was up 15%. Since 2003, the average cost has risen 67% due to increased medical costs as well as the size of settlements

given to plaintiffs – and are still on the rise.



California continues to have the largest number of claims in the U.S. and Ohio has the second highest number of claims. Even though New York is third, it is registered as the highest average cost per claim in the country.

Other reasons for these increasing numbers is not just due to dog bites. Results are also from dogs knocking down children, cyclists and senior citizens – resulting in fractures and other injuries that increase the severity of the losses.

Victims and homeowner

insurers are not the only ones paying for the dog bites. Workers compensation for the US Postal Service costs about \$3.7 billion a year.

It is not always a stereotyped dog breed that is the cause. Experts have said that even normally docile dogs may bite when they are frightened or when defending their puppies, their owners or their food. The most dangerous, though, are those that suffer from poor training, irresponsible owners and breeding practices that foster viciousness.



Secure Funds Up Front. One way to shift cash your way is to ask for all or a portion of payment up front. Asking for at least a deposit before you begin work protects both you and your customer. And if you establish the policy fairly and properly, it shouldn't alienate good customers.


Accept Credit Cards. Help speed cash into your account into your bank account by accepting credit card payments (it does require a small transaction fee). If you already have a merchant credit card account, encourage customers to use this option more often. Also consider new technology such as Square, which allows credit card transactions to be made using smart phones, regardless of where you do business. This technology expedites the flow of cash into your bank account, sometimes as quickly as the next business morning, and adds a welcome measure of convenience for your customers.

Monitor Receivables. A healthy cash flow also requires close attention to your receivables—the money that customers owe to you for products or services you've delivered. Create a detailed "aging schedule" of what you are owed, by whom, and for how long. Call overdue accounts, focusing first on the largest amounts due. Don't rely on email unless you feel certain you'll receive a response.

2016 Annual Enrollment Period For Seniors

The Annual Enrollment Period (AEP) is here (October 15 – December 7), and you're going to see a lot of ads trying to get your attention. If you get confused about Medicare coverage, you are not alone. Many Medicare plans are now marketed under

brand names that can add to the confusion. Here is

a simple breakdown of what you really need to know.

Most of the advertising during AEP is for Medicare Advantage plans. Almost all of the Advantage plans are HMOs and they use the same physicians groups here in our area. There are differences in these plans, different co-pays and deductibles, but almost all have no premium at all. In other words, you pay nothing for this Medicare plan. How can that be?

Each of these Advantage plans from private insurers is paid by Medicare for each person they enroll. In other words, Medicare will pay your private insurer for you, so that Medicare doesn't have to cover your medical expenses in the future. In return, the Advantage plan will lower your out-of-pocket costs significantly. In many cases, you might not pay anything out-of-pocket for common services like doctor appointments or lab work.

So, you pay no premium, you pay a lot less out of pocket, and the plan gets a big check from Medicare. This sounds too good to be true, right? Well, there is a trade off.

On an Advantage plan, you assign your Medicare benefits to a private insurer. You are now a member of their regional HMO. You have a primary care physician assigned, and you must get referrals to specialists who are also in that HMO. You can't use your regular Medicare benefits to go see another doctor outside the HMO, because your benefits are assigned to that one specific plan.


If you live away from the desert part of the year, chances are very slim that there are doctors in other areas that will take your Advantage plan insurance. You may have a specialist in Washington State, for instance, and you have been seeing him under your Medicare plan. But if you are in an HMO, you assigned those Medicare benefits to a private plan, and gave up your original Medicare.

If you live here year round, these plans can save you a lot of money and may even improve your health care. After all, the idea of an HMO is to help you maintain good health, something we all want to enjoy.



Choosing the Right Medicare Drug Plan

As we are in the Annual Enrollment Period for Medicare Advantage and Prescription Drug Plans (October 15 through December 7), it seems appropriate to address helpful tips when choosing a drug plan. There is never a single company or drug plan that is right for everyone. The following tips may help you avoid common mistakes when selecting a drug plan.

1. Check the plan's drug formulary for your medications. The plan's benefit pages alone, which include deductibles and co-payments for each tier, do not necessarily provide an accurate indication of what your costs will be through the year. For example, even though you may take a particular generic drug, the formulary drug list for a plan may place that drug on a brand name tier rather than on a generic tier, or worse yet, not even include the drug at all in their approved formulary drug list, causing you to pay more for it.




Know how your drugs are covered in the coverage gap. All Part D drug plans have a gap (donut hole) in coverage after the cost of purchased drugs reaches a particular accumulated amount for the year. If you anticipate reaching the donut hole, check to see how your drugs are covered at that time. While plans may offer discounts during the gap, some plans also include coverage for some drugs in the gap, which can reduce your out-of-pocket expense. Also, the timing for entering the donut hole can vary on different plans.

Some plans even have different costs for participating pharmacies, for "preferred participating" and "standard participating pharmacies." Since the cost of your drug can vary based on the pharmacy you use, it is helpful to know the level of participation of your pharmacy, and if it might be appropriate to either change your drug plan or change your pharmacy.

There are a number of resources to answer these questions when considering a drug plan, including Medicare.gov. If you prefer visiting someone in person, a local licensed agent who is certified with several Medicare Advantage and Drug Plans will typically be able to provide objective advice and recommendations. These professionals can assist you in your research and are never any cost to you.


Do You Have a Broken Heart?



Stages of Alzheimer's Disease

Alzheimer's disease typically progresses slowly in three general stages – mild, moderate and severe. Since Alzheimer's affects people in different ways, each person will experience symptoms or progress through the stages differently.



The symptoms of Alzheimer's disease worsen over time, although the rate in which the disease progresses varies. Changes in the brain related to Alzheimer's begin years before any signs of the disease.

The stages that are mentioned below provide an overall idea of how abilities change once symptoms appear and should only be used as a general guide. While there are three stages of the disease, it may be difficult to place a person with Alzheimer's in a specific stage as stages may overlap.

Mild Alzheimer's Disease — In the early stages of Alzheimer's, a person may function independently. The person may still drive, work and be part of activities. While this is happening, the person may feel as if they are having memory lapses, such as forgetting familiar words or the location of everyday objects.

Moderate Alzheimer's Disease — During this stage of the disease, the individual may have greater difficulty performing tasks, but they may still remember significant details about their past.

Severe Alzheimer's Disease — The final stage of the disease is when individuals lose the ability to respond to their environment, they can no longer carry on conversations, and eventually can no longer control movement. There may still be words or phrases, but communicating becomes difficult. As cognitive skills and memory continue to worsen, the entire personality can change.

Pearls of Wisdom

Pearls are organic gems, created when an oyster covers a foreign object with beautiful layers of nacre. Fine natural pearls are highly valued as gemstones and objects of beauty for many centuries. As a result, the pearl has become a metaphor for something rare, fine, and valuable. There are two main types of pearls, those that occur naturally and those that are cultured.

A pearl is created by the concentric layers of CaCO3 as they are deposited around an irritant. This may be a piece of mantle lobe or some other material. Once used in trading for more than 6000 years, this luminescent gem has been prized as a symbol of luxury since antiquity.

When asked the difference between sea pearls and freshwater pearls, I tell my customers that both saltwater and freshwater pearls consist of the same material but vary in price. A single strand of pearls can range from \$35 - \$35,000+.

Freshwater pearls are less expensive and grown in lakes, ponds and rivers. A freshwater mollusk can create up to 50 pearls at a time, as opposed to an Akoya pearl oyster

that will produce only one to three pearls at a time. This accounts for the difference in price.


There is the Akoya, the Freshwater, the Tahitian and the South Seas Pearl. The Tahitian, Akoya and the South Sea are amongst finest and rarest you will find in the jewel world.

With so many pearl products to choose from, numerous sources to buy from and differing pricing, where does one stand in the product/pricing mix? The answer is research and a little patience. Here is a six step method to qualify the novice:

- 1. Understand the variety of pearls, i.e., shape, size and mass production
- Choose the appropriate pearl size beginning with 1mm all the way to 18 mm
- 3. Learn to identify quality distorted (baroque), flawless, etc.
- 4. Link pearl quality to market value color, luster and surface
- 5. Decide on a single strand, ring, bracelet or custom made piece
- 6. Select a trusted jeweler who is highly educated in pearls call ahead

In December, Boucher Fine Jewelers will be holding a one-hour class to teach buyers how to identify pearls with the number one pearl company in the USA. Bring in your pearls in for a free examination and valuation. They will be raffling off a pearl necklace at the event.

Chamber Member Chili Recipe

Roasted Pabalano & Sirloin Chili

By: Richard Bentley, La Quinta Chamber of Commerce Member

INGREDIENTS

4 poblano peppers

 ${\bf 2}$ tablespoons extra virgin olive oil, plus some for drizzling

Salt & freshly ground black pepper, to taste

2 1/2 lbs sirloin, trimmed, thinly cut and chopped into bite-size pieces

1 large red onion, chopped

4-5 garlic cloves, chopped

2 tablespoons chili powder

1 tablespoon cumin

1 tablespoon ground coriander

1 teaspoon sweet smoked paprika

12 ounces dark Mexican beer, Negro Modelo

1 (28 ounce) can fire-roasted tomatoes

lime, juice and zest of

1/2 lb manchego cheese

3 scallions, finely sliced



DIRECTIONS: Preheat broiler to high. To roast the poblano peppers, drizzle them with extra virgin olive oil, season with salt and pepper, and place on a cookie sheet. Transfer to the broiler, turning every 1-2 minutes, until charred on each side.

Remove from the oven, place in a brown paper bag and seal to keep the steam in for about 10-15 minutes. If you do not have a brown paper bag, place in a bowl and cover with plastic wrap for about 10-15 minutes.

After that time, peel the skin off, remove the seeds and stem, and chop into bite-size pieces.

While the peppers are steaming in the bag or bowl, place a large dutch oven over medium-high heat, add 2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil, two turns of the pan. Add the steak and brown, about 3-4 minutes per side.

Add the red onion, garlic, chili powder, cumin, coriander and smoked paprika to the pot and cook for about 4-5 minutes.

Add the beer, scraping the bottom of the pan with the back of a wooden spoon to release any brown bits. Add the tomatoes, chopped poblano peppers, lime zest and juice, and simmer for 10-15

minutes.

To serve, ladle a portion of the chili into a bowl and top with grated manchego cheese and finely sliced scallions and enjoy!





What You Need to Know Before Donating Hair

Being in the hair replacement industry, I often get asked about hair donations. People call to see where to donate hair, if I am able to make a wig out of donated hair or even if it's possible at all. Donating hair to charity is an admirable and personal decision, but finding the right charitable organization can be daunting.

- 1. Make sure the charity ACTUALLY provides hair replacements for FREE if they claim to. Several well-known charities charge recipients based on a sliding scale based on their household finances and recipients could end up paying thousands of dollars. If the charity requires financial documents be submitted along with the hair application, they likely charge fees.
- 2. Make sure the charity provides full, HUMAN hair replacements. Some charities provide synthetic blend hair pieces, which are cheaper to produce.
- 3. Make sure the charity does not REQUIRE the recipients to participate in their promotional/marketing efforts and/or events and that there are no hidden charges or additional fees. Certain charities require before and after photos, that recipients attend and volunteer for events, that tickets be purchased for events, etc., in order to be considered for a "free' hair replacement. These activities should be voluntary and never required.
- 4. Determine WHO to donate your hair to. Some organizations provide hair replacements to adults only, children only, cancer patients only, alopecia-afflicted children only, etc.
- 5. Ask whether the charity uses ALL hair donations to produce hair replacements for recipients. It has been reported that some organizations may sell donated hair to the hair replacement and/or hair extension factories and for a profit.
- 6. Compare the number of recipients each charity provides for annually. You can determine which charities invest a higher percentage of proceeds into their mission by comparing annual funding versus number of recipients. A review of the charity's financials is prudent to ensure that they use the majority of their charitable dollars towards their mission, rather than for expenses unrelated to the charity. All charities are required to report their financials, and to include them on their websites. It's always a good idea to give them a quick review to get an idea of how their charitable dollars are spent.
